# Beaumaris Primary School Community Meeting 29/3/12

Unedited as presented to Sandringham College Em Hall

## Summary of proceedings:

Sandringham College's second primary school meeting was held at Beaumaris Primary School on the 29<sup>th</sup> March 2012.

The tone of the evening was more questioning than previously experienced, with many community members feeling that they do not have belief in the future of the Beaumaris Campus, unless government monies are invested. This lack of confidence the security of its future is based on a sense of previous broken promises.

Strong support for a standalone campus still remained, with community members offering suggestions as to how to ensure the longevity of the campus. The community acknowledged that strong relationships need to be developed with surrounding schools in order to ensure the success of the Beaumaris Campus.

Fairly equal views held about co-ed or a single sex future for the Beaumaris Campus.

Overall, it was felt that the Beaumaris Primary community felt disconnected from the current structure of Sandringham College.

### Notes from the Beaumaris Primary School Meeting.

#### **Group One:**

- Vibe in community concern re: academic of Sandringham College
- BNPS /BPS has good academic/reputation carry through to a local boys school.
- Prefer high academic school -not a tech school.
- Forms strategic alliances with high performing schools.
- Standalone school is preferred.
- Possible shared facilities with Mentone Girl's Secondary.
- Possible shared learning opportunities with Mentone Secondary.
- Sandringham College has HUGE IMAGE problem need to change this image there MUST be stand alone. //New school image// it would take years to turn around the Sandringham College email, if not stand alone.
- Same families may attend Mentone Girls Secondary for girls, and need to send boys to a standalone boy's school. We feel only local option is private with academic learning environment.
- Community feels we have a great girls school locally we NEED and want a good academic boys school locally.
- No government boys school locally.
- 7-12 is preferred by this group. Senior students have a huge impact on junior students. As mentors, guides, buddies, etc.
- New school, new reputation, new identity therefore be 7-12
- Private schools all over years 7-12, this school to be competitive needs to be the same.
- Preference is Single Sex.
- Most important is Standalone, Academic Excellence, must be 7-12
- But some don't mind if co-ed as long as it doesn't effect/dilute what the school has to offer. E.g subjects offered at year 11/12, specific to boys.

- By making it co-ed it becomes a competitor for girls so does it rule out alliances, with Mentone Girls Sec.
- There has been a HUGE neglect of our boy's education in this area. Just as our girls are entitled to good academic education in senior years. So are our boys.
- In our families there is a pressure/tension emotional and financial because families are torn because daughters can go public and boys are being send to private schools/businesses because we want a high academic boys standalone school.
- Parents wants to be involved and are involved in public schools.
- If you have a very good high academic school locally it improves culture of area, vital community outlook fosters community pride. Keeps boys local, improves overall community feel. People want to stay / move to area. Students will reflect their learning /vision.
- Want to have subjects available e.g maths/science/ IT available through ALL years 7-12. Must be standalone with ONE STRONG LEADER, ONE Principal and ONE Campus.
- Been an assumption by the government that boys will be sent to private with Sandringham as a safety net if they done. REALITY is parents want a high academic public school 7-12.

- Separate for English and Maths, together for electives. Not parallel all of the time.

- Change idea that Beau Campus is not for academic kids
- Other local schools, private take kids
- · Change many encourage people to go to Beaumaris
- Girls move from Mentone at year 11+12 to Sandringham.
- People need to believe in Beauy.
- It is an asset. It is critical that becomes the best. It needs to be a real alternative to private schools.
- Aesthetically the school needs a lot of attention as it stands it puts people of going there.
- Virtual Classrooms are needed. it would broaden education possibilities, Cultural and subject expansion.

- Change has to happen limited resources now.
- Language offered are not the same as local primary schools continuity between local primary schools and year 11/12 Campus.
