- Need to use community, especially active PS communities locally

- Debate re. academic vs technical/other focus. Opinion split between need for strongly academic focus given the demographics of area and need to provide alternatives to strictly academic. Students need opportunities. Other schools offer strong academic side. What is the reputation of the college? How does it impact on enrolments?
- Wide selection of subjects at Senior Campus (both technical and academic) but does community know?

Question Two

- Concern re perception that Beaumaris was let down by formation of College. Need for community to regain ownership, therefore stand-alone better. Perception of this campus as 'poor relative' damaging.
- Standalone because of distance to Senior Campus and stability
- What about cluster with other schools in the area to provide choice?
- Standalone because perception that Senior Campus has enough to draw from
- Standalone because people in the area want quality, public, local option. More likely to attract enrolments. School should reflect community.
- Senior Campus success due to wide range of subjects not possible at a standalone

- Need for trade options, vocational options alongside academic. 3 sites offers this but still keeps small school environment on each campus. Broadens options.

- Concern that the link between success at/advantages of Senior Campus and enrolment

at this campus is not made in public's minds.

Question Three

- Standalone preferred from Sandringham. Better for choice in the state system and for parent input.
- Need to stay a part of Sandringham. Better for sharing teaching resources between campuses. Good for subject specialism selection staying a part of the Sandringham community.
- Should be standalone. Needs to break away from the model it currently has. If joining with anyone, needs to be Mentone Girls'.
- Don't believe that it works as part of the Sandringham model. If standalone, there would be additional funding.
- Governance really depends on selection of model. Would be more opportunity under the Sandringham hat.

- Balance of sexes may determine whether school should stay as part of Sandringham College, or as a new standalone – many parents do not wish to send their girls here due to this imbalance – hormones etc
- Standalone evidence based by examining situation in regard to numbers and proportion of gender.
- Sandringham run but with improvements.
- Overwhelming majority of discussion group favour standalone campus (boys) with community links.
- Sandringham as three campus model will ensure funding and strength in future. Strength in numbers.
- Governance not integrated with politics standalone would benefit community, other schools in region are now zoned. Private school education is now out of reach for many parents, parents could send children to a Beaumaris standalone if they see a school of excellence on the Beaumaris site. Not as alternative, but as first option. Yearning for a private school style education in public school.
- Share subjects and facilities between Mentone and Beaumaris boys if governance is in place.
- More of the "same" will not get school more money from government, needs change from Sandringham College model.
